  - I don't want to work on character
  - I would rather die than have to obey and consequently "want" good for others
    - 1) Unbelieving Sailors: Jonah 1:11-12
    - 2) Lost Ninevites: Jonah 4:2-3
  - I am going to disobey so I will remain on my own
  - Why do I have to continually disadvantage myself to advantage others? John 21:21-22
- B) Our Victorious Savior
  - "I don't want to do what I \_\_\_\_\_ God wants me to do" Luke 22:41-42
